### Musical activities

You might think that lockdown meant no performances.....but the Menuhin School pupils have not let that stop them! For the first seven weeks of term we ran **Lunchtime Concerts** over Teams, with pupils either playing live from their homes or sending in recordings. When the School reconvened on 8 March we reverted to live Lunchtime Concerts, and continue to prepare **Showcase Concerts** with a pupil audience for sharing with the wider community.

Many of the pupils are preparing videos for **online auditions with European music conservatoires**, as well as a selection of the many **online competitions** which have sprung up over the last year – keeping everyone in the Hall very busy!

Just before Half term we were asked to make a short inspirational video for the Surrey Music Hub with the seven pupils that were living together in Harris House. After some thought, we found one of Brahms's Hungarian Dances for which we had a piano duet version and also string parts; the only slight difficulty was that the string parts were in F sharp minor, whereas the piano music was in F minor! The pianists, Richard and Miffy, graciously gave way and transposed their music to fit in with the string players. The pupils also recorded a brief message of encouragement to the young musicians in the Surrey Hub to inspire them to use their music as a way to keep their spirits up during this latest lockdown.

We have also enjoyed a new look to Saturday mornings. Oscar and Elliott Perks have produced a weekly Perks Podcast in which they discuss various aspects of being a chamber musician, covering areas such as intonation and rehearsal techniques. This has been followed by Miho's Mates -Miho Kawashima in conversation with alumni or people she has met during the course of her career. These have proved extremely popular with everyone who has seen them. The older pupils have then spent time with choir director **David Condry**, who has given seminars on the realities of life after the Menuhin School. The Condry Column, as it is known, has covered subjects such as finding a flat, dealing with utilities, and how to talk to the tax man.









# YMS partners with Orchid Classics

YMS is thrilled to be partnering with London-based record label Orchid **Classics** in an exciting collaboration that will introduce our pupils to the intense concentration, discipline and satisfaction of recording. The first album will be released in 2022, and will feature performances recorded in our own Menuhin Hall, which is renowned for its acoustics. These recordings will document the music made by the next generation of professional performers, and be of invaluable experience to their all-round musical and personal development.

The Orchid deal, the first of its kind for YMS, will run initially for three years, and provide a focal point for followers of YMS pupils. It was directly inspired by Yehudi Menuhin who began his recording career at the age of 13 and remained with the same record label for almost

70 years, the

longest contract

in the history of

recorded music.







Of the partnership, Ashley said: "This is a wonderful educational opportunity for our pupils, and represents an exciting development as the School enters a new phase in its

> illustrious story. Our first album will showcase the diversity and internationalism of our community, and I can't think of a more appropriate record label with which to ioin forces."

#### Orchid's founder and Director, Matthew

Trusler, said, "I've always felt it was important for Orchid to work with exceptional young people at the beginning of their careers," he observes. "We've now released award-winning debuts from such artists as sopranos Louise Alder and Natalya Romaniw, pianist Boris Giltburg and cellist Andrei Ionita. This new relationship is massively exciting in the promise it holds to bring performances by these incredible young musicians to a wider public while allowing them to experience the thrill of making their first recordings."

## Virtual Menuhin School - pilot programme

We are excited to announce the launch of the pilot phase of the Virtual Menuhin School. This new learning experience was created to make the expertise of YMS available to a wider group of talented young musicians around the world, and focuses on the under-11 age group. It offers a highly individualised learning pathway that includes online social interaction with a

peer group, and a sense of community and engagement with the main School.

This term we have welcomed two eight-year-old pupils, Margaret, a violinist from Paris, and Sapphire, a pianist from Hong Kong. From April, we will also welcome Lyana, a 10-yearold Armenian cellist, and Brando, a nine-year-old violinist from Italy.

These young musicians are having online instrumental tuition and guidance, as well as tailored lessons in musicianship, theory and composition. Marco Galvani, Ayaka Shigeno and Elliott Perks are our first teachers to be involved in the Virtual Menuhin School, and they have been doing a fantastic job at making the newest members of the YMS family feel welcome.

# Testing, testing 1...2...525!



Over the years the Recital Room has seen many uses - concert space, teaching room, lecture hall, meeting room, photography studio and even a cocktail party venue, but this term its primary function has been more utilitarian; it has seen the completion of **525 asymptomatic COVID-19 tests**.

As part of our efforts to get back to work (and play!) the School has put in place a number of prevention and detection measures to stay COVID-free. One of the most important has been lateral flow testing of all pupils and staff on site. **Alison** and **Joanne** had the unenviable task of

implementing a system of testing that takes into account the ever-evolving restrictions and advice, the needs of our pupils, our bespoke timetabling and demands on staff time. They have been heroically assisted by a number of people: Niamh and Polly, who have both worked far outside of their normal hours; Jan who recently joined our Housekeeping Team; Victoria, who joined us this term as Day Matron; and **Peter Emery** (Caroline's husband) and Mingjia Li (Enpei's mum), who very kindly volunteered their time to come and muck in to help keep us on track. We are indebted to them for their help.

It has been a gargantuan effort from all involved, and they deserve their own special round of applause.

European counterparts.




#### **New staff**

#### Transformational gift from the Estate of the late Nancy Ann Wolfers

The School has received the second tranche of a significant bequest from the estate of the late **Nancy Ann**Wolfers for our Bursary Fund. Nancy was a great lover of music and her generosity will help her passion live on through the many pupils who will benefit from her support.

Nancy's generous bequest comes at a critical time, when demands on the School's Bursary Fund are higher than ever before. This is, in part, because of the impact of COVID-19 on many of our parents, and in part because of Brexit, as fewer pupils are now eligible for support under the Department for Education's Music and Dance Scheme. We estimate that we may need to

provide up to £1.7 million in bursary funding over the next two academic years in order to support our existing pupils and allow talented new pupils to take up their place at the School.

Legacies are a vital source of philanthropic support and have been critical to major developments at the School over the years, including the building of The Menuhin Hall and the Music Studios. Congratulations to **David and Gillian Potts** who won First Prize, and a pair of tickets to a Showcase concert in The Menuhin Hall!


#### Leavers concert at King's Place: 8 July 2021
