Kasina and Richard were both awarded prizes at the Tunbridge Wells International Music Competition, with Kasina earning a Merit and Richard a Distinction.


Mia won Third Prize in the inaugural Rossall International Piano Competition.

A new partnership

on a new partnership with the international classical music agency **Cambridge Creative Management** (CCM), who currently represent the Brodsky Quartet, the pianist Martin Roscoe and the conductor Stephen Layton MBE. This exciting new collaboration will offer our pupils the opportunity to perform on the world's major stages through a new approach to the School's management of external engagements.

In the first relationship of its kind for the School, Cambridge Creative Management will act as agent to our young musicians, seeking professionallevel external engagements for them throughout the UK, Europe and around the globe. Building on the performance opportunities already on offer to the pupils, CCM will endeavour to help build in external engagements, giving a heightened taster of the careers already forged by our remarkable alumni. Initial performance projects will include developing the School's orchestral touring programme, focusing on our biennial visit to the Gstaad Festival; increasing the visibility of the annual Leavers' Concert (held this year at London's Kings Place) through further performances of the programme on offer; and exploring further ways to celebrate the School's 60th anniversary in 2023.

Director of Cambridge Creative Management, Sarah Trelawny Ford, welcomes the new collaboration as an exciting development in the short life of the agency so far. "CCM was born out of a loyalty and dedication to artists and classical music during an exceptionally difficult year for many in the industry," she says. "It's an absolute honour to be asked to work with some of the world's finest young musicians, securing a future for this incredibly important performance medium, and I am personally so excited to be working with those at the beginning of their careers. It feels a real privilege to be a part of the start of the creative process."

On the road again...

On 21 June, 12 of our musicians were thrilled to finally be able to play our first outside concert for over a year.

Though it was billed as 'Music for a Midsummer's Evening', the weather was far from summery, but we had a warm welcome as always from our hosts from the Banstead Arts Festival and All Saints Church, and from the very appreciative socially-distanced audience. They too seemed pleased to be out! It was a treat for me to get out of the office and accompany the concert party along with Ioan and Cathy - particularly special for me as

my wife and I were married in that church. The acoustics are very good with a clear balanced sound all round.

The programme too was very well balanced, starting with Haydn Op 33 No 4, followed by Beethoven Op 18 No 2 before the short interval - no refreshments allowed at the moment. The second half was a new piece for me, Vaughan Williams' Piano Quintet. This is an early chamber work that he himself withdrew and was then not played until 50 years after his death when his widow Ursula gave permission. The audiences of that era missed out on an uplifting piece with



extra character added by the piano and a double bass.

It was a privilege to be part of such a special evening.

Alumni news

Benjamin Baker released a new recording with Delphian Records in April. 1942 features sonatas by Copland, Poulenc and Prokofiev all written in the same year spanning three different continents and a variety of personal situations for the composers in what was a very challenging time in history.

Breanainn Ó Mathuna, known professionally as Braynin, released his debut 'Butterflies', a catchy pop anthem exploring moments of

heartache wrapped up in a deceptively feel-good soundscape that blends elements of pop, trap and dance. The track is available to download from most streaming services.

Recent graduate Viviane Plekhotkine has just been awarded the Performer Prize at the RCM Contemporary Competition.

Violinist Charlotte Saluste-Bridoux is among the winners of this year's Concert Artists Guild Virtual Competition. Held in conjunction with the Young Concert Artists Trust, the competition aims to give talented young players mentorship and performance opportunities at the start of their careers.

The Sitkovetsky Trio has released an animated film depicting the composer Maurice Ravel in and around Paris, as a prequel to their July album release of Ravel's trio and Saint-Saëns' Piano Trio No 2 in E minor Op 92. The animation by artist Pavel Hudec illustrates some of the influences that are heard in Ravel's beguiling music written in 1914.



Progress at the Menuhin School, Qingdao

Key appointments have been made to the senior staff of the Menuhin School in Qingdao, China.

YMS alumnus, celebrated violinist and Qingdao native **Lu Siqing** will join as President. Hailed as one of the most outstanding Chinese violinists of his generation, Mr Lu was invited at the age of 11 by Yehudi Menuhin to join the School, and has since performed to critical acclaim at some of the world's most famous concert halls in more than forty countries throughout North and South America, Europe and Asia.

Mrs Zheng Ren will lead the new school as Headmistress. Mrs Zheng is an esteemed leader with years of experience in education.

Mark Stringer has been appointed
Deputy Head, and will take the lead
on all musical activities. A highly
experienced senior leader and
musician, Mr Stringer is currently
Director of Music at Wells Cathedral
School, and previously directed the
academic and commercial operations
of Trinity College London in 60
countries. As a performer, lecturer,
adjudicator and examiner,

he has worked in the US, Asia, the Middle East, Africa, Australasia and Europe.

Mr Stringer said:
"I am delighted to
have been appointed
Deputy Head at the
Menuhin School Qingdao.

This ambitious, exciting venture will establish a world-renowned specialist music school which will recruit the finest young musicians from China,



Asia and further afield. Our high calibre teachers will coach and equip the next generation of performers for the international stage. Building on the ethos and values of Yehudi Menuhin and the School he founded in the UK, the Menuhin School Qingdao will nonetheless have its own distinctive dynamic and identity. Its inspirational architecture, world-class acoustics, unparalleled facilities and technical infrastructure combined

with a pioneering, progressive
curriculum will ensure that
the School becomes one
of the world's elite
centres of learning and

training."

He will benefit from a collaboration with The Yehudi Menuhin School's current Director of Music,

Ashley Wass, who will act as a musical consultant to the Chinese school. This appointment will facilitate close links between the two schools.

We were delighted to finally welcome several of the trustees of The Wallace Curzon Charitable Trust to The Menuhin Hall for the formal, public inauguration of our new Steinway Model D, which we purchased last year thanks to a substantial grant from the Trust. Fritz Curzon, Sir Clifford's adopted son, told audiences a little bit more about the personal connection between his father and Yehudi Menuhin.

Together, they recorded pieces by Lili Boulanger at the request of Lili's sister Nadia Boulanger (who taught at YMS), and also shared the same yoga teacher, who used to visit them both every Saturday in their homes in Highgate. As the Trust wound down earlier this year, we were truly privileged that they chose us for their final generous gift, which we hope will bring joy to our pupils, staff and audiences for years to come.

Culture Recovery Fund Success

The Menuhin Hall received a lifeline grant of £51,000 from the Government's Culture Recovery Fund to help offset the impact of almost a year of closures.

The funding has been vital in helping us to continue to run the Hall and make plans for the future when the Hall's income has been so adversely affected over the past year.

While much of the funding is being used to cover core costs, some of it has also allowed us to explore options for a more developed version of our Virtual Menuhin Hall, allowing us to

build on the digital transformation of the past year and reach out to new audiences far beyond the physical confines of the Hall.

Introducing the Virtual Menuhin School

This academic year, YMS has been piloting a new initiative to reach even more young talented musicians from across the globe.

An unexpected benefit of the global pandemic is that we found it is quite possible to teach to a very high standard online. Whilst there can never be a full replacement for in-person teaching and performance, it is possible to remove the geographical barriers that might prevent some talented young musicians from accessing the excellent musical education offered here at YMS.

The Virtual Menuhin School combines instrumental tuition and guidance with tailored lessons in musicianship, music theory and composition. Pupils have a highly individualised timetable that includes online social interaction with their peers, as well as a sense of

community and engagement with the rest of the YMS pupils and staff.

The aim of VMS is to provide these young musicians with the tools they need to apply to be full-time pupils on site in the coming years. The full Virtual Menuhin School is launching in September 2021, with 10 pupils from around the globe. We are delighted that

the Friends Committee have awarded the School a grant of £10,000 to support bursaries for these pupils next year. We look forward to introducing the pupils to you fully in September, and wanted to share how some of the pupils from this pilot year have been getting on. We are grateful to The Linbury Trust who provided funding for the pilot project initiative.
